

Facts about the Texas Death Penalty

(As of October 1, 2017)

- New death sentences in Texas have **dropped dramatically** since peaking in 1999, when juries sentenced 48 people to death. Since 2015, juries in Texas have imposed the death penalty in eight cases and **rejected it** in seven other trials. To date in 2017, juries have imposed two new death sentences (in Jefferson and Walker Counties).
- Just **7 counties** account for **65% of new death sentences** imposed in the last five years.

- Since 1973, **159 individuals** – including 13 people in Texas – have been released from death rows nationwide due to evidence of their wrongful conviction.
- The State of Texas has executed **543 people** since 1982, accounting for more than one-third of the 1,460 executions nationwide since 1977.
- To date in 2017, the State of Texas has put **5 people to death**, out of 18 executions nationwide.
- Currently, there are **234 people on death row** in Texas, including 6 women; this is the smallest death row population since the late 1980s.
- In Texas, the cost of an average death penalty case is **nearly three times higher** than imprisoning someone in maximum security for life.
- **31 states** have now abandoned the death penalty in law or practice.
- **141 countries** have abolished the death penalty in law or practice.
